

Events in the District have this year focussed on the 125th Anniversary of the Association. Two quarter peal days have been held on 18th July and 15th August, the former preceding a BBQ hosted by the Mack family at their residence in Welwyn Garden City, and the latter incorporated into a Picnic and Rounders Match in Verulamium Park.

An Association wide celebration was held on October 31st, when open ringing was held at each of the towers in the city, followed by a service in the Cathedral. Following more open ringing at the Cathedral, members assembled in the crossing for a group photograph before dining in the refectory. A full report of the event has been published in the Ringing World.

A large number of peals and quarters have been rung in the District to celebrate the anniversary, and many of these are detailed in this newsletter. Please send in any that have not yet been published and these will be included in the next newsletter which will be in May / June 2010.

David Gregory



David Gregory, who died in early August aged 72, was the much loved Ringing Master of the Welwyn band from 2003. David and his wife Mary took up bell-ringing with great enthusiasm after they began attending St Mary's Welwyn in 1998. Trying to make up for their late start, they went on numerous courses – the Essex course to learn Bob Doubles; Bob Minor and Cambridge Minor with Phil Gay at Keele and Stedman Doubles at the Marches Teaching Belfry with 'Frog' (John Turney). They returned for annual ringing holidays at the Marches between 2001 and 2006, taking almost the entire Welwyn band with them in 2002. David and Mary rang regularly at practices at Datchworth; at St Stephen's in St Albans for about three years, and for the last year or two at Lemsford. By the time of his death, David had rung at 220 towers.

David was a man of enormous talent and energy. During his early career as an engineer with the BBC, David and his family were based in New York where he organised communications for outside broadcasts and was in the press corps at the Kennedy Space Centre for various Apollo missions from 8 to 15. Whilst at Houston he took flying lessons and went solo. Back in Welwyn Garden City in the 1970s, David was responsible for the construction of a new organ for St Francis Church including voicing and tuning. In 1979

he joined British Aerospace working in a group involved in satellite communications. He was chief engineer for the consortium that made the successful application for a licence to operate a mobile phone network, which subsequently became Orange. After early retirement from British Aerospace in 1992, David started a consultancy in telecommunications and sound recordings, including working with independent producers making programmes for Radio 4. He made several series of "Random edition" with presenter Peter Snow, and "Master Musicians", approximately 80 programmes in all. David also made recordings of music for Guild and ASV labels, as well as Toddler Tunes with his daughter Frances and transcriptions on to CD for the pianist Philip Fowke and the organist Peter Hurford.

Alongside his professional work, David was involved with many other projects for churches and in the home, and his expertise continued to grow. In the 1990s David's interest in clocks and watches had commenced, initially to overhaul the clocks inherited from his parents; this developed into real expertise which was much in demand. David became an expert horologist, specializing in long case clocks and pocket watches. David also brought his energy and skills to the service of the very successful Welwyn Magazine and the creation of the Church website that won an award. He became a trustee of the Herts and Beds Churches Media Trust, and worked with the Bishop of St. Albans, Christopher Herbert on a number of projects. In 2003, following an operation for bowel cancer, David became involved with the project at St Mary's to build New Church House. He was a huge asset to the project team, particularly for the clarity of his thinking and was the driving force behind the design and installation of the unique environmentally friendly heating system of ground source heat pumps that now heats the entire church and the new building. In the ringing chamber David installed a computer simulator linked to two bells and a speaker extension to the church sound system, the latter to enable the band to commence ringing immediately following a wedding!

David was a kind and thoughtful man, and very caring for others. Having taken up bell

ringing relatively late in life, in the ringing chamber he had great empathy with learners, both young and old. David was always such great fun and is greatly missed by all in the Welwyn band.

Whitechapel Bellfoundry Visit

On Saturday October 17th Judith and Barry Mack organised a District visit to the Whitechapel Bell Foundry with two towers in the East End afterwards, all followed by a curry in Brick Lane.



The visit was timed to start just after lunch which gave people the chance to visit some sights in London during the morning. A prompt start was made by Alan Hughes who gave an overall background of the company and the art of bell casting to the group in the foyer before beginning the tour round the foundry. The group was shown from room to room in the order of the moulding, drying, casting and tuning of a bell and finishing the ground floor part of the tour in the large erecting shop where several whole sets of bells were on display and sometimes (but not this time) a completed frame with bells and all fittings including wheels are erected before being shipped out. This large bell area of the foundry is a most fascinating place to be in, generally tidy but strewn with bells some on their sides all with chalk marks denoting where they come from, their weight and note. Down the end is a large cylindrical furnace and a small upright furnace beside which don't quite look what they are all surrounded by templates hanging on the walls and other materials in the corners of the room all covered in dust. The one large old upright machine set in at floor level is a tuning lathe capable of tuning the largest bells they can produce at the moment; this looks quaint with its new cast bell all shiny and mouth upwards on the lathe surrounded by small cuttings from the bell on the floor.



Next the group were taken to the top of the building where there was a sawmill and wood working shop for the construction and manufacture of the wheels, stay, sliders and other wooden components, another very dusty area.



We then came down a level to the Handbell department which concentrated on tuning and buffing of the bells, the manufacture of the handles out of leather and the assembly of the clappers. On entrance to this small but long room we noticed a long line of 40 finished

handbells on the centre table, the surrounding benches and walls were covered in components ready to be assembled.

Alan must have enjoyed our party as the 1 hour tour lasted 2 hours before we made it into the gift shop at the end.

The 10 bells of All Saints, Poplar and St. Anne's, Limehouse were available for ringing afterwards it being a 20 minute walk to Poplar and 10 minutes to Limehouse with its white stone tower surmounted by a sphere connected to the clock which rises and falls.

A curry was always on the cards, Kathryn and Quenton Jones knew of a good curry house in

Brick Lane where we could barter a good deal, so after a quick goodbye to those not joining us most of us caught the next bus into town to Aldgate where after walking down a couple of backstreets and being beckoned into several curry houses with even better deals offered each time we settled in our chosen restaurant called "Monsoon" where for a tenner we had a starter, main and 2 drinks all expertly negotiated by Quenton.

Thank you to Barry and Judith for organising the visit to the foundry and the ringing afterwards at the two towers.
